STRATEGIC PLAN:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 1: Produce innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for Southern Californians.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

On May 1, 2014, the General Assembly adopted a resolution in support of endorsing a regional effort to promote a pedestrian and bicycle safety initiative. To pursue this effort, SCAG launched Go Human, a Regional Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign, with funding from the Active Transportation Program. To extend campaign efforts, SCAG applied for Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety funds from the Office of Traffic Safety in the amount of \$1,250,000 to conduct a fifth round of Go Human safety programming and outreach across the region. On June 17, 2020, SCAG was informed that the grant award was being tentatively offered. SCAG is seeking Regional Council approval to receive the funds.

BACKGROUND:

In the six-county SCAG region, walking or bicycling accounts for 8.9% of all trips, but 27% of all roadway fatalities, according to Connect SoCal, SCAG's Adopted 2020-2045 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). To address this, the SCAG 2014 General Assembly passed a resolution to support a regional safety initiative aimed at improving roadway safety for bicyclists and pedestrians. To



implement the resolution, SCAG secured \$2.3 million in Caltrans grant funding from the statewide 2014 Active Transportation Program call for projects to coordinate a Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

Using these grant resources, SCAG successfully initiated the Go Human Campaign with the launch of a first round of advertising and outreach in September of 2015 as well as three additional grant opportunities through the Office of Traffic Safety to implement safety activities. The advertising campaign has secured almost one billion impressions to date (each time an ad is seen) region-wide through a combination of SCAG's initial investment, added value media secured through op-eds and press outlets, and donated media from local and county partners. SCAG has also completed and extended the other components of the initial grant scope of work which includes implementing a series of Go Human events in partnership with local cities as well as developing toolkits aimed at creating active transportation champions.

To continue the Go Human Campaign's momentum, SCAG applied for an additional \$1,250,000 in funding from the Office of Traffic Safety to extend the campaign into 2018. On June 17, 2020, SCAG received notice that the award was being tentatively offered. If awarded, this funding will be used to conduct a fifth round of safety engagement and programming. Funds will be used to support localized safety outreach for drivers, pedestrians and bicyclists across the region, through the Community Ambassador Safety Program, Resilient Streets Technical Assistance and Mini Grant Program, and Sub Regional Safety Peer Exchanges. SCAG is seeking Regional Council approval to receive the funds.

FISCAL IMPACT:

If awarded, SCAG will receive \$1,250,000 in grant funds from the Office of Traffic Safety that will be utilized for the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

A RESOLUTION OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS AUTHORIZING THE ACCEPTANCE OF TENTATIVE GRANT FUNDS FROM THE OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY

WHEREAS, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is the Metropolitan Planning Organization, for the six-county region consisting of Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, Riverside, Ventura, and Imperial counties;

WHEREAS, on average, 1,500 people are killed and 136,000 are injured in traffic collisions throughout the SCAG region every year;

WHEREAS, in the SCAG region, 563 pedestrians and bicyclists were killed in traffic collisions in 2016, representing 33% of all traffic fatalities in the region;

WHEREAS, SCAG has applied for an award of \$1,250,000 in Office of Traffic Safety, Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety Funds ("Grant Funds"), to support the Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign;

WHEREAS, the primary goal of the Office of Traffic Safety is to "effectively and efficiently administer traffic safety grant funds to reduce traffic deaths, injuries, and economic losses";

WHEREAS, the Grant Funds will be used for the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign, which will involve consulting services to extend the Go Human Advertising Campaign and support Community Outreach and Engagement strategies focused on safety and resiliency;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Regional Council of the Southern California Association of Governments to authorize SCAG to accept and administer the Grant Funds to support the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. That the Regional Council hereby authorizes SCAG to accept the tentative Grant Funds in the amount of \$1,250,000 Office of Traffic Safety to support the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.
- 2. That SCAG's Executive Director or his designee is hereby designated and authorized by the Regional Council to negotiate, finalize and execute all

necessary agreements and other documents on behalf of the Regional Council as they relate to supporting the Southern California Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign.

Mr. Panas reported this was the second amendment to the current year budget; the proposed amendment totaled \$248,000 and increased the budget from \$89.2 million to \$89.5 million. He stated the amendment does four things: 1) adds the \$400,000 grant for the Interstate 710 North Mobility Hubs plan, which came from FY 21 Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant program; 2) increases by \$131,000 the FY 21 SB-1 Sustainable Communities Grant program in accordance with the final allocation SCAG received; 3) it decreases by \$339,000 Transportation Development Act consulting work for the Electric Vehicle Study project, which is now being funded by the SB-1 Sustainable Communities Formula Grant; and 4) includes a minor adjustment to the third-party participation in the amount of \$56,000.

A MOTION was made (Finlay) to adopt Resolution No. 20-624-2, approving Amendment 2 to the FY 2020-21 (FY21) Overall Work Program (OWP) and authorizing the Executive Director, or his designee, to submit the necessary documentation to the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). President Richardson reported that Mr. Panas was retiring, and this would be his last month with SCAG and Regional Council meetings tomorrow.

CFO MONTHLY REPORT

Chief Financial Officer Basil Panas reported that on August 12, 2020, SCAG received a final letter of resolution concerning the Caltrans cost audit. He reported the letter stated that SCAG had provided adequate documentation to demonstrate implementation of the corrective action plan, that Caltrans had received the \$339,000 of costs that were disallowed by the division of local assistance and that SCAG had submitted documentation supporting SCAG's repayment of \$1.8 million in disallowed costs by cost substitution. Of the \$4.4 million that were disallowed by Caltrans between the two audits, SCAG repaid \$339,000 and the rest was forgiven because SCAG had shown it had spent that amount and more in local funds on qualified federal projects. With respect to the external financial audits, Mr. Panas stated that field work would commence later in the month and the Comprehensive Annual Financial Audit report and Auditors report would be issued in December. Lastly, with respect to dues, Mr. Panas reported that as of September 1, 2020, 116 cities and four counties had renewed their memberships, 64 of which had taken advantage of the 20% dues wavier that the Regional Council approved. He stated 61 percent of the assessment had been collected and that left 72 cities and two counties yet to renew and three cities being recruited for membership.

President Richardson asked if the membership numbers were normal. Mr. Panas stated it was in line with prior year activity. President Richardson requested a breakout by region and how they typically received renewals. Staff acknowledged the President's request.

Second Vice Chair Jan Harnik asked if 61 percent was customary in every other fiscal year. Mr. Panas stated that it was.

Councilmember Margaret Finlay, Duarte, District 35 asked if the cities and counties had given any reasons for not paying membership dues. Mr. Panas stated that cities who had instituted processes paid their dues before October when SCAG staff sent out the reminder. He stated that between October 1st and December 31st usually everybody pays.



BUSINESS REPORT

Mr. Randall Lewis reported that the housing market was still very strong, but that lumber costs had gone up incredibly in the last three months, adding pressure on house prices. He reported that rentals were still very strong, and people weren't moving. Additionally, he stated that collections were beginning to go down and it was going to put some stress on the market and landlords. He reported there was fear amongst the developers, especially in California, what with the potential of rent control or more taxes. With respect to the retail side, he reported that good tenants were doing well, and bad tenants were struggling. Mr. Lewis also reported that there was a lot of discussion on whether the recovery was going to be a "v, w or woosh." He stated he noticed that people were saying that maybe all those models on the recovery were wrong and they were using the phrase "it's going to be a K recovery." He clarified that this meant it was not going to be a uniform recovery and that there were certain segments that were going to keep getting better from a business point of view and others that would continue to get worse. Mr. Lewis also reported that he was seeing a lot more on how to analyze land use as a fiscal tool. He stated that Eastvale and Rancho Cucamonga were using new models that they were studying and being exposed to. He reported that the traditional way was to look at fiscal use, especially in terms of density. He stated that some of this new modeling implied that previous assumptions were wrong. Mr. Lewis also reported on the housing front and expressed disappointment that housing legislation had not moved forward this session. He stated that if they were going to get some housing built in California, he thought they were going to have to work with the legislature and get them some help to come up with bills that were still respectful of local control so that they could give the tools to the cities to get some housing built.

Councilmember Margaret Finlay, Duarte, District 35, asked if the lumber mills were operating at diminished capacity and why that would be the case.

Mr. Lewis indicated the reasons he had heard were that: 1) do it yourself projects were taking off, as evidenced by home improvement retailers' success; 2) with respect to hurricanes and floods, it was expected that there was going to be a lot of rebuilding, so the future markets would go up; and 3) tariffs. Lastly, he stated a lot of the lumber mills had shut down during the pandemic and would have to retool again. He reported they were hearing reports of people saying that not only was it the highest it's ever been in history, but it may be higher by a 50 percent margin. He stated that homebuilders have expressed concern about prices.

Councilmember Cheryl Viegas-Walker, El Centro, District 1, indicated there was a lot coming out from both sides with respect to the ballot split and Proposition 13 and asked Mr. Lewis what he had heard with respect to the economic data on outcomes.

Mr. Lewis reviewed Propositions 13 and 15. He discussed reasons for and sources of both support and opposition.



Councilmember Ryu, Los Angeles, District 51, noted that he was present at the meeting.

First Vice President, Clint Lorimore, Eastvale, District 4, thanked Mr. Lewis for the recognition of their city manager. He also stated the presentations Mr. Lewis made were so valuable to this organization and he personally found them extremely valuable.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Richardson thanked the members for participating in the EAC Retreat. He stated it was a good time to sit down and have some follow up conversations individually with members. He stated they had a pretty clear idea of the work they had cut out for them and that it would all start tomorrow with the adoption of Connect SoCal, which was the foundation for the economic recovery. He stated they would begin talking, charting, mapping out and working through the process of shaping, to help drive their economic recovery across the region. He indicated a part of this was going to be their 11th Annual Economic Summit. He reported it would take place on December 1st, and for the first time it was going to be held online because they were still dealing with the pandemic. He stated as they worked to recover from the unprecedented impacts of the virus, this summit would bring together voices in business, planning and academia to help define strategies for building a strong, inclusive resilient Southern California economy.

President Richardson reported that tomorrow they were going to be considering Connect SoCal for final adoption. He stated it was an incredibly important plan, and this was the conclusion of the 120-day period established to be able to finetune and work with stakeholders to ensure the Plan was right and considers all local input. He reported that members should have already received letters from stakeholders in support.

President Richardson also reminded everyone of tomorrow's meeting schedule, with Policy Committee meetings at 9:00 a.m., the Joint Meeting of the Policy Committees at 10:30 a.m. and the Regional Council meeting at 1:00 p.m.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Executive Director Kome Ajise stated they were looking forward to tomorrow as it was a culmination of work that they all had been doing together for the last two plus years. He stated they were going to have Policy Committee meetings because there were some items that they felt the policy committees needed to hear, specifically in the EEC as the PEIR was being presented there again. He stated there would be a housing program discussion at CEHD and a Sustainable Communities Program Guidelines presentation at TC. He reported that they decided to have a Joint Policy Committee (JPC) because it made more sense to have one discussion on Connect SoCal. He stated the elements that would be in front of them at the JPC and ultimately go to the RC, was the



work they had been doing over the last four months to update and make some technical refinements, which basically was updating some of their growth information that they had in terms of entitlements. He reported that there was an addendum to the PEIR, which was to reconfirm the environmental status of the document itself, the setting of the document, and based on some feedback they got from some of the stakeholders, updated some of the technical results and statistical reports that they had in the PEIR. He stated this ensured that they were taking notes and input during the 120-day period. He reported that staff would also be presenting an implementation plan and an emerging issues outlook document that would accompany the Connect SoCal document for consideration at the RC. He expressed that they felt like they were able to collectively, both staff and stakeholders, use the time given to them, and learned some things on the process going forward as they move ahead in updating the plan.

Mr. Ajise recognized Chief Financial Officer Basil Panas. He informed the EAC members that they had a resolution for Mr. Panas, who had worked with SCAG for the last 14 plus years as the Chief Financial Officer and was retiring. He reported that Mr. Panas had taken the agency through major milestones and various improvements. Mr. Ajise presented a resolution, recognizing Mr. Panas for his exemplary career and thanking him for his dedicated service to SCAG. He stated Mr. Panas wanted to see SCAG through the resolution of the audit and stayed through that. As addressed in Mr. Panas's report, SCAG had resolved all the audit issues. On behalf of the executive team, Mr. Ajise congratulated Mr. Panas on his retirement.

Chief Financial Officer Basil Panas stated he had been with SCAG since 2006. He provided remarks and thanked members for the privilege of serving the region as SCAG's CFO.

Councilmember Margaret Finlay, Duarte, District 35, thanked Mr. Panas for his commitment to SCAG, to the Regional Council and to the region.

First Vice President, Clint Lorimore, Eastvale, District 4, stated Mr. Panas was a consummate professional, but more than that he was an amazingly kind gentleman.

Immediate Past President, Bill Jahn, Big Bear Lake, District 11, stated last year when SCAG was going through the audit, he was comfortable with the work that Mr. Panas was doing and knew he was going to see them through it. Like the previous speakers, he proceeded to congratulate him.

President Richardson thanked Mr. Panas and congratulated him for an incredible career and leaving SCAG in great standing and very high regard.

FUTURE AGENDA ITEM/S

There was no request for future agenda items.



ANNOUNCEMENT/S

There were no announcements.

ADJOURNMENT

Lastly, President Richardson took a moment to acknowledge Councilmember Jose Luis Solache, Lynwood, District 26, whose mother, Maria Luz Solache, had recently passed away. President Richardson stated that Mr. Solache was an incredible public servant and student body president in college, which inspired him to be student body president in college. President Richardson closed the meeting in honor of his mother, offering this as a token and an extension of their condolences in support for him and his family.

There being no further business, President Richardson adjourned the Special Meeting of the EAC in honor of Maria Luz Solache at 3:46 p.m.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Recommend that the Regional Council approve Resolution No. 20-625-2 to authorize the acceptance of \$10 million in grant funds from the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) to implement Phase 1 of the Last Mile Freight Program.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

From:

This item supports the following Strategic Plan Goal 1: Produce innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for Southern Californians. 2: Advance Southern California's policy interests and planning priorities through regional, statewide, and national engagement and advocacy.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The SCAQMD's Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) has created a Regional Goods Movement Program which includes a last mile freight component. SCAG will partner with the MSRC, serving as implementor of the Last Mile Freight Program. SCAG recommends the Regional Council adopt a resolution which would authorize SCAG to accept grant funds in the amount of \$10 million to implement Phase 1 of the Last Mile Freight Program.

BACKGROUND:

Last mile freight is a crucial and growing area of focus with the increasing purchase of goods by consumers through e-commerce, especially in light of COVID-19 related impacts. Goods movement activities are a significant source of NOx and PM_{2.5} emissions in the South Coast Air Basin, causing hazardous air pollution and public health concerns in our region. Accordingly, SCAG's Connect SoCal emphasizes strategies to address air quality through cleaner and more efficient operation of vehicles, largely by modifying or replacing the existing regional fleet of goods movement equipment with cleaner technologies or efficiency improvements. To facilitate implementation of Connect SoCal, SCAG will serve as implementor of the Last Mile Freight Program through a contract with the MSRC, developing a two-phased approach as follows:



Phase 1: Establish a call-for-projects process, focusing on the procurement and commercial deployment of zero-emission or near-zero emission (ZE/NZE) heavy and/or medium duty on road trucks (can include ZE/NZE equipment and supporting infrastructure).

Phase 2: Conduct robust outreach to expand Phase 1 projects and coordinate with both public and private sector stakeholders to deploy broader innovative technologies currently being demonstrated by leading last mile delivery companies, particularly in e-commerce use-cases.

SCAG has been working with the MSRC staff over the course of 2020, and the Last Mile Subcommittee since this past summer, to develop the Last Mile Freight Program, and gain approval from the MSRC Board for a contract award. SCAG staff is seeking approval of a resolution to authorize the acceptance of a grant from SCAQMD to implement Phase 1 of the Last Mile Freight Program, and authorize the SCAG executive director or his designee to negotiatie, finalize and execute related agreements.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Current work associated with this item is included in the FY 2020-21 Overall Work Program (OWP) budget under project number 130.0162.18, Goods Movement Planning. After the approval of a contract with SCAQMD, the grant funds will be programmed in the OWP.

WHEREAS, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is the Metropolitan Planning Organization, for the six county region consisting of Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, Riverside, Ventura, and Imperial counties pursuant to 23 U.S.C.§ 134 et seq. and 49 U.S.C. §5303 et seq.;

WHEREAS, the Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) unanimously approved that SCAG implement the Last Mile Component of MSRC's Goods Movement Program, hereafter called the Last Mile Freight Program;

WHEREAS, on September 4, 2020, based on the MSRC action, the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) awarded \$10,000,000 to the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) in SCAQMD funds to undertake the Last Mile Freight Program (Grant Funds);

WHEREAS, the primary goal of the Program is to deploy Zero Emission and Near-Zero Emission (ZE/NZE) heavy and/or medium duty on road trucks (including equipment and supporting infrastructure) for commercial demonstration in the counties of Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino;

WHEREAS, the Program would consist of four distinct activities for SCAG to: (1) develop Program Guidelines and Call-for-Projects; (2) perform screening and selection of project proposals in consultation with the MSRC; (3) develop and enter into Memorandum of Understandings (MOUs) with each selected project; and (4) oversee and manage the implementation, monitoring, and reporting on progress of projects;

WHEREAS, the Program is anticipated to be implemented from Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-21 through FY 2021-22.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Regional Council of the Southern California Association of Governments, that:

- 1. The Regional Council hereby authorizes SCAG to enter an agreement with SCAQMD, to accept and administer the Grant Funds in the amount of approximately \$10,000,000 to support the SCAG Last Mile Freight Program; and
- 2. SCAG's Executive Director or his designee is hereby designated and authorized by the Regional Council to negotiate, finalize and execute all agreements and other documents on behalf of the Regional Council as they relate to the Grant Funds supporting the SCAG Last Mile Freight Program.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Staff seeks to amend the contract of PC Law Group to increase its respective contract value. SCAG's policy provides that the Chief Counsel may enter into legal service contracts on behalf of the agency provided the services are under \$25,000, with said services requiring Regional Council approval should they exceed \$25,000. The subject contract was previously authorized by the Chief Counsel in Fiscal Year 2017-18. Staff seeks to increase the contract value of the firm's contract by \$272,000 for FY 20-21, based on legal services anticipated by the Acting Chief Counsel related to the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) process, implementation of the 2020 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS or Connect SoCal), and California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) matters.

This amendment when combined with previous amendments exceeds 30% of the contract's original value. Therefore, in accordance with the SCAG Procurement Manual (dated 04/17/20) Section 9.3, it requires the Regional Council's approval.

The hourly rate for Pat Chen will increase from \$325 an hour to \$340 per hour. This is the first hourly rate increase that Pat Chen has charged SCAG since she first started working as a SCAG Consultant in 1998. The contract amendment will also include an associate at the rate of \$265 per hour.

Background & Scope of Work: On February 5, 2019, SCAG awarded Contract No. 19-001-C01 to Cambridge Systematics, Inc. to assist staff with developing a Regional Climate Adaptation Framework ("Framework"). The scope of work includes development of tools and resources to assist local and regional jurisdictions in managing the negative impacts of climate change and includes studies and analyses on how the Southern California region can work together to plan and prepare for the impacts of extreme heat, increasingly frequent and damaging wildfires, and other climate-related issues. Over the course of the project, SCAG and Cambridge Systematics, Inc. worked with local municipalities, advocacy groups, and other stakeholders to assess the unique issues affecting the SCAG region, available planning tools and resources, scientific data, and messaging strategies.

Staff requires additional consultant assistance due to impacts of COVID-19 on completion of the Framework and opportunities to expand on previously identified in-person outreach to other modes of communication - including webinars, podcasts, and enhanced web tools - as well as opportunities to produce more comprehensive data analyses on climate change impacts across the region through use of Connect SoCal Growth Vision datasets.

This amendment increases the contract value from \$939,896 to \$1,112,795 (\$172,899).

Project's Benefits & Key Deliverables:

The project's benefits and key deliverables include, but are not limited to:

- Formation of a new and on-going SCAG working group made up of city and county representatives, transportation planners, land use planners, public and investor owned utility companies, and other interested stakeholders, to improve regional communication on adaptation planning efforts in the SCAG region;
- Development of a regional adaptation strategy that includes risk categories for critical infrastructure such as transportation facilities, as well as decision-making and tracking tools for use by cities and counties; and

The total contract expenditures through June 30, 2020 were \$895,412. Based on the new contract value of \$1,112,795, the amount to fund in FY 2020-21 is \$217,383. Funding in the amount \$217,383 is available in the FY 2020-21 Overall Work Program (OWP) budget in project number 145.4834.01.

Basis for the Amendment: Discussions between SCAG and Cambridge Systematics, Inc. revealed the holistic impacts of COVID-19 on the project beyond the initial estimated impacts on the project's outreach components, such as presentations at regional and subregional agencies across the SCAG region. These discussions highlighted opportunities to further build upon the project's outreach component and public-facing deliverables. Since COVID-19 related quarantine will likely continue through the extended contract period, SCAG and the consultant revised some of the previously identified in-person outreach to other modes of communication, including webinars, podcasts, and enhanced web tools, which increased the contract value (approximately \$9,000).

In addition to expanding upon the project's outreach component, staff has a need to ensure the project's data analyses on climate change across the region aligns with the Connect SoCal Growth Vision data through 2045. Staff also has a need for additional analyses on climate change impacts tied to wildfire risk and climate adaptation financing, as well as additional analyses using the most up-to-date data on the region to help provide more comprehensive resources, tools, and analyses for jurisdictions engaging in their own adaptation planning efforts. In order to conduct these analyses, the original project tasks related to the "Multimodal Transportation and Land Use Analyses and Toolkits" deliverables will need to be rerun using the adopted (approximately \$153,000).

Lastly staff has the need to expand on both the outreach components and scenario analyses in light of the "new paradigm" and challenges that COVID-19 and climate change impacts, such as wildfire risk, present to long-range planning for local stakeholders (approximately \$10,899).

The works efforts of this project will provide jurisdictions with a roadmap to adaptation in an effort to help build a more resilient Southern California and help feed into SCAG's development of a "Regional Resilience Framework."

STATE

Sacramento End of Session Update

The second year of the State Legislature's two-year session officially adjourned at 1:29 a.m. on Tuesday, September 1, 2020. The start of the year promised to be focused on housing production, environmental concerns, and wildfire prevention. However, with the rapid spread of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Legislature's plans came to a halt and on two occasions was forced into extended recesses to contain and respond to COVID outbreaks within the capitol community. In a typical year, more than 3,000 legislative measures and resolutions would be introduced and debated by the Legislature. Due to the truncated legislative calendar, this number was reduced to around 500.

Leadership in the State Senate and Assembly attempted to advance critical legislation in their respective chambers, but in the end, many of the year's most significant public policy issues failed to move forward. For those measures that were successful, the Governor has until September 30, 2020 to sign or veto them. Although rarely used, the Governor has the power of the "pocket signature" where a bill automatically becomes law if not signed or vetoed by the deadline. The 2021-22 legislative session will convene on Monday, December 7, 2020.

Housing

After the stunning defeat of SB 50 (Wiener, D-San Francisco), the controversial housing bill that would have required cities and counties to change their zoning laws to allow for new, denser





housing near job centers and public transportation, in January, legislative leadership and Governor Newsom committed themselves to advancing some kind of legislation that would address housing production in the state.

In the State Senate, Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins (D-San Diego) and Housing Committee Chair Scott Wiener lead a package of five bills that they hoped would spur affordable housing production and aid California's economic recovery due to the COVID-19 crisis. These measures included SB 902 (Wiener), SB 995 (Atkins), SB 1085 (Skinner, D-Berkeley), SB 1120 (Atkins), and SB 1385 (Caballero, D-Salinas). All the bills include modifications to existing California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requirements for housing projects. Some of these bills were held in committee, while others passed both houses of the Legislature but left no time for the Senate to concur to late amendments. None made it to the Governor's desk.

Although the Assembly did not announce a similar "package," four bills aimed at spurring housing production also include amendments to curtail duplicative CEQA review and made other changes to CEQA requirements for housing. These measures were AB 1279 (Bloom, D-Santa Monica), AB 2323 (Friedman, D-Burbank and Chiu), AB 2345 (Gonzalez, D- San Diego and Chiu), and AB 3155 (R. Rivas, D-Morgan Hill and Quirk-Silva, D-Fullerton). The big picture message of these bills is that CEQA is an obstacle to the timely approval and construction of housing. All of these bills were held in committee except for AB 2345, which revises the Density Bonus Law to increase the maximum allowable density and the number of concessions and incentives a developer can seek, is now being considered by the Governor.

Transportation

On the transportation front, the Legislature advanced SB 1351 (Beall) to authorize the State to issue revenue bonds to fund and accelerate certain transportation rehabilitation projects. The legislation would allow the Transportation Improvement Fee Finance Committee to authorize up to \$5 billion in revenue bonds to be allocated to Caltrans to expedite projects in the California Transportation Commission-approved 2020 SHOPP (State Highway Operation and Protection Program) that have also completed environmental clearance and project design. The revenue bonds would be repaid from Caltrans' portion of the Transportation Improvement Fee, an annual fee assessed on the market value of a motor vehicle in California. This bill is now awaiting action from the Governor.

Additionally, to assist transportation agencies that have seen steep declines in ridership and revenues, the Legislature approved a series of statutory relief measures in AB 107 (Committee on Budget), a budget trailer bill. It would provide temporary flexibility in the use of State Transit Assistance – State of Good Repair program funds and would authorize a transit agency to expend funds apportioned for the 2019-20 to 2021-22 fiscal years, inclusive, on any operating or capital costs necessary to maintain transit service levels, provided the governing board of the recipient transit agency makes a declaration that the expenditure of those funds is necessary to prevent



transit service levels from being reduced or eliminated. AB 107 is awaiting consideration by the Governor.

FEDERAL

Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 Appropriations Update

October 1, 2020 marks the beginning of FY 2021 for the federal government. The House has passed all but two of the 12 annual federal agency spending bills. The Senate has not yet introduced any of its FY 2021 appropriations measures. In early September, Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin reached a tentative agreement to use a short-term Continuing Resolution (CR) to maintain government funding and avoid a government shutdown. The House hopes to vote on a spending bill the week of September 21, 2020, and the Senate would take up the CR the following week. It appears a CR would extend past Election Day into mid-December, which is customary during an election year. It will likely be a "clean" CR meaning it will not include any new funding or policy provisions. It is also possible that a one-year FAST Act extension may be attached to the CR.

FAST Act Transportation Reauthorization

The FAST Act authorizes multi-year federal policy for surface transportation, including highways, transit and rail. It is set to expire on September 30, 2020. The House has passed a large, five-year reauthorization bill, the INVEST Act, as part of an even larger infrastructure bill, the Moving America Forward Act (H.R. 2). The Senate passed a section of its reauthorization bills in July of 2019. With the lack of action in the Senate and the looming expiration of the FAST Act, it is now expected that Congress will pass a one-year extension of the existing FAST Act through the end of FY 2021. The extension will likely be attached to the CR under discussions between the Speaker and the Secretary of the Treasury. The extension will likely provide the same level of funding as in the final year of the FAST Act, but there are efforts underway to increase the funding levels if the needed revenue can be identified.

COVID-19 Federal Aid Package

Negotiations on a fifth COVID aid package resumed in late July to find some common ground. By this point the House had passed the Health and Economic Recovery Omnibus Emergency Solutions (HEROES) Act (H.R. 6800), which would provide \$3 trillion in emergency funding to help with the coronavirus response effort. SCAG was supportive of this legislation as it would provide \$915 billion in direct and flexible aid to state and local governments of all sizes. Senate Republicans introduced the Health, Economic Assistance, Liability Protection, and Schools Act (HEALS Act), which would provide \$1 trillion in COVID-19 relief funding. Notably, the proposal failed to include any new funding for state and local governments. By August 7, 2020, talks broke off over cost, funding priorities, and the size of the deficit. Instead, Congress adjourned for a monthlong summer recess.





When the Senate returned after the Labor Day weekend, Majority Leader Mitch McConnell announced that he would hold a vote on a smaller \$500 billion targeted aid measure that would be attached to an unrelated bill on China, S. 178. The narrow proposal would extend supplemental unemployment benefits at a reduced level of \$300 through December 27, 2020, additional funding for the Paycheck Protection Program, and liability protections for schools and businesses as they reopen, however, there was no relief funding for local governments or transportation. The bill needed to clear the 60-vote threshold to end debate. On September 10, 2020, the Senate failed to advance the pared-down relief bill by a vote of 52-47.

The House has no votes scheduled from October 5 to November 15, while the Senate's tentative calendar includes a recess from October 12 to November 6, 2020. This, of course, allows Members of Congress to return to their districts and states for the November 3, 2020 election. However, amid mounting pressure from rank-and-file Democrats to deliver more pandemic relief before lawmakers leave town, Speaker Pelosi announced that the House will stay in session until congressional leaders can reach agreement on a long-stalled coronavirus relief package, possibly cutting short the monthlong recess in the run up to the November election. At this point it is unclear how or when relief legislation will proceed.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

On May 1, 2014, the General Assembly adopted a resolution in support of endorsing a regional effort to promote a pedestrian and bicycle safety initiative. To pursue this effort, SCAG launched Go Human, a Regional Active Transportation Safety and Encouragement Campaign, with funding from the Active Transportation Program. To extend campaign efforts, SCAG has secured Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety funds from the Office of Traffic Safety annually since 2016. Most recently, SCAG secured a grant in the amount of \$1,000,000 to conduct a fourth round of Go Human safety programming and outreach across the region. With this funding, Go Human launched a regional safety advertising campaign, achieving 300 million impressions, and provided resources to jurisdictions across the region through co-branding and technical assistance, as well as mini grant opportunities to community-based organizations to implement street level safety strategies for people walking and biking.

BACKGROUND:

The SCAG region, like California and the nation, experienced a period of annual declines in traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries until 2012 when they began to steadily rise. Although the region has made some progress on safety, on average between 2012 and 2016, 1,500 people are killed, 5,200 are seriously injured, and 136,000 are injured in traffic collisions each year. About 73





percent of those killed between 2001 and 2016 were in vehicles or on motorcycles, while the remaining 27 percent were walking or bicycling (disproportionate to their mode share, 12 percent of all daily trips are walking or biking trips). The numbers of both pedestrians and motorcyclists killed are the highest they have been for more than a decade. These collisions are happening in every city across the region.

To heighten awareness of the region's transportation safety challenges and opportunities, and to reduce collisions resulting in serious injuries or fatalities, SCAG launched the *Go Human* campaign in 2015. *Go Human* is an award-winning community outreach and advertising campaign with the goals of reducing traffic collisions and encouraging people to walk and bike more in the SCAG region. *Go Human* is a collaboration between SCAG and the County Transportation Commissions and Public Health Departments in the region. The campaign provides advertising and educational resources to partners and implements temporary safety demonstration projects to showcase innovative transportation designs and help cities re-envision their streets as safer, more accessible places for walking and biking.

The *Go Human* program has been funded annually through the California Office of Traffic Safety for the past four years. During the most recent grant period, ending September 30, 2020, with \$1,000,000 in funding, *Go Human* implemented a variety of strategies to improve the safety of residents walking and biking across the region.

This item is being presented to inform SCAG Policy Members of the highlights and outcomes of *Go Human's* recent grant activities, including the regional advertising campaign, message co-branding with jurisdictions, the Resilient Streets program, and the *Go Human's* Safety Mini Grant Program.

Advertising Campaign

SCAG launched *Go Human*'s paid regional advertising campaign during the month of August 2020 with updated, stakeholder-tested messaging, in anticipation of the time of year with the highest rate of collisions due to reduced daylight hours. The media purchases targeted drivers with a "point of engagement" strategy, utilizing billboards, gas pump toppers, convenience store sheets, bus shelters, digital and social media ads, among others, with messaging reminding drivers to slow down and watch for pedestrians. The campaign flight achieved over 300 million impressions (each time someone views the advertisement). To date, *Go Human* has achieved over 1.3 billion impressions related to traffic safety messaging across the region. Additionally, SCAG completed an evaluation of the campaign effectiveness and found that over 80 percent of drivers found the ads motivating.



Co-Branding & Leveraging Strategies

To extend the reach of the paid advertising campaign, *Go Human* implemented a local co-branding strategy with partners. *Go Human* developed 17 partnerships, distributing over 2,800 material. Campaign creative was utilized outside of the SCAG region, including in Placer County in support of their Active Transportation Program funded project, complementing infrastructure strategies with safety messaging. Other strategies leveraged the advertisment campaign to advance a message of safety. The SCAG Safety Pledge called on local governments to commit to improving safety by adopting a Vision Zero plan, hosting a pop-up safety demonstration, implementing a safety outreach campaign, among other actions. The Pledge was signed by 44 signatories representing 32 jurisdictions. The *Go Human* Safe Driver Pledge encouraged drivers to keep everyone on the road safe and was signed by 122 residents of the SCAG region. SCAG's highly successful *Go Human* Twitter Chat further engaged stakeholders in virtual safety conversations, reaching over 80,00 unique viewers and building over 430,000 impressions.

Local Community Engagement and Safety Mini-Grant Program

In conjunction with the advertising campaign, *Go Human* launched the Local Community Engagement and Safety Mini-Grants (Mini-Grants) program. Developed as funding program to improve safety for people walking and biking, the program expanded the concept of traffic safety in response to the pandemic and efforts to reduce the transmission. *Go Human* awarded more than \$210,000 in funding to 28 projects across the region. Awarded projects spanned a wide range of creative engagement activities that prioritized the mobility and transportation needs of those most impacted by COVID-19. Projects included storytelling radio series focusing on transit, virtual workshops for youth, free bike match and repair for essential workers and families, and co-creation of community resilience and safety resources, among many other creative and impactful projects. Mini-Grant awardee efforts reached an additional 76,500 people to support safety and street level resiliency planning.

Kit of Parts and Resilient Streets

Go Human's Kit of Parts is an engagement tool for jurisdictions to temporarily demonstrate safety infrastructure. Designed with modular elements, the Kit, through a no-cost loaner program, supports planning efforts by showcasing potential and planned street design treatments that support public space, improve equity, and enhance community resiliency. Inclusive of five different design treatments (protected bike lanes, parklets, crosswalks, pedestrian refuge islands and bulbouts), as well as signage and evaluation tools, the Kit was deployed 16 times throughout the past 12 months (prior to the onset of the pandemic). As a result of the growing demand, Go Human





designed and developed two additional Kits, to be housed in four different Counties in the following grant year, managed by community-based partners.

As a response to the impacts of the pandemic, SCAG launched its Resilient Streets Technical Assistance program in recognition of emerging needs and practices. Across the country, jurisdictions and community stakeholders have repurposed street space for aid distribution, resource delivery, and temporary infrastructure for bus rapid transit (BRT), among other purposes. Resilient Streets utilize street space for community resiliency, recovery, and resource delivery that prioritizes disadvantaged and vulnerable communities.

To provide technical assistance to jurisdictions, SCAG hosted a Resilient Streets webinar series that reached a total of 129 practitioners and community members. SCAG has also developed a robust Resilient Streets Toolkit that functions as an integrated programmatic component of the Kit of Parts. The Toolkit demonstrates ways of adapting components of the Kit of Parts to support resilient street projects and identifies case studies, funding sources, and other practical considerations for planning and implementation.

FISCAL IMPACT:

All costs associated with this item are included in the FY 2020-21 Overall Work Program (OWP) under project number 225-3564.13 and funded by a Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Program Grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety.

SCAG is the primary agency responsible for the development and maintenance of Travel Demand and Air Quality Models for the SCAG Region. SCAG uses both models to provide state-of-the-practice quantitative analysis for Connect SoCal (the Regional Transportation Plan and Sustainable Communities Strategy — RTP/SCS), the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP), and Air Quality Management Plans (AQMPs). Staff updates and validates both models for each cycle of the RTP/SCS. The trip-based Travel Demand Model was last updated to TransCAD v6 platform and used for SCAG's 2016 RTP/SCS. In the recent 2020 RTP/SCS, SCAG moved to an activity-based Travel Demand Model on TransCAD v8 platform. But the Travel Demand Model will be maintained for a variety of project analysis in the region and sub-regional model developments. The Travel Demand Model is also the foundation of the Sub-regional Model Development Tool (SMDT).

SCAG provides modeling support and services to SCAG member agencies, transportation commissions, subregions, and Caltrans. Staff uses the SMDT to enhance SCAG's service quality and efficiency. The SMDT streamlines the development of models for agencies wishing to create subregional models based on SCAG's Regional Model. It also promotes model consistency between the Region's various modeling agencies and greatly reduces the cost and effort required to create subregional models. The current SMDT is built on TransCAD v6 platform to be compatible with the Travel Demand Model.

Since the Travel Demand Model network format and the assignment stage of SCAG's new Activity Based Travel Demand Model are built on the newer version of TransCAD software (v8), some functions and file format of TransCAD v8 are not compatible with the current TransCAD v6. The objective of this project is to update the SCAG Travel Demand Model and the SMDT to the same software platform (TransCAD v8) as SCAG's Activity Based Model.

AUDITS:

External Financial Audit

Eide Bailly LLP, SCAG's outside independent auditor, is presently conducting final audit fieldwork and the audited CAFR and Single Audit Report will be released in December.

MEMBERSHIP DUES:

As of September 15, 2020, 119 cities and 4 counties had renewed their memberships, 65 of whom took advantage of the 20% dues waiver. 61.3% of the assessment has been collected. This leaves 69 cities and 2 counties yet to renew. Three cities are being recruited for membership. Second reminders will be sent in early October.

BUDGET & GRANTS (B&G):

On August 31, 2020, staff submitted the Fiscal Year 2019-20 (FY20) Overall Work Program (OWP) Year-End Package to Caltrans, which included the certification of final expenditures, the final progress report, and the final work products for projects completed in the fiscal year. The final expenditures reported for the year were \$44 million or 48% of the OWP budget.

On September 3, 2020, the Regional Council approval formal amendment 2 to the FY20 OWP in the amount of \$248,220 which increased the OWP budget from \$89.2 million to \$89.5 million. This amendment includes adding a new grant for the Interstate-710 North Mobility Hubs Plan under the FY21 Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Program; reprogramming FY21 SB-1 Formula Grants for the Sustainable Communities Program and reducing Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds. Staff submitted the complete amendment package to Caltrans on





September 11, 2020.

CONTRACTS:

In August 2020, the Contracts Department issued four (4) Request for Proposals; awarded five (5) contracts; issued six (6) contract amendments; and processed 25 Purchase Orders to support ongoing business and enterprise operations. Staff also administered 141 consultant contracts. Contracts staff continued to negotiate better pricing and reduced costs for services. Thus far in FY21 staff negotiated approximately \$531,616 in budget savings.

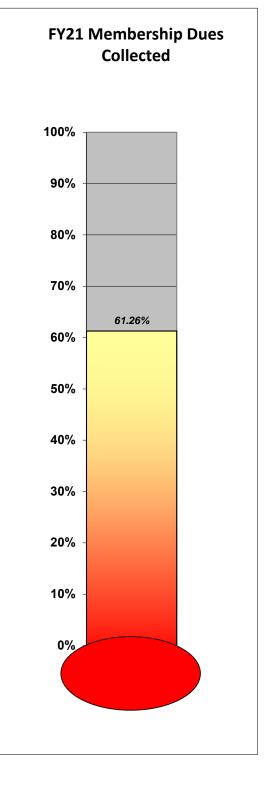

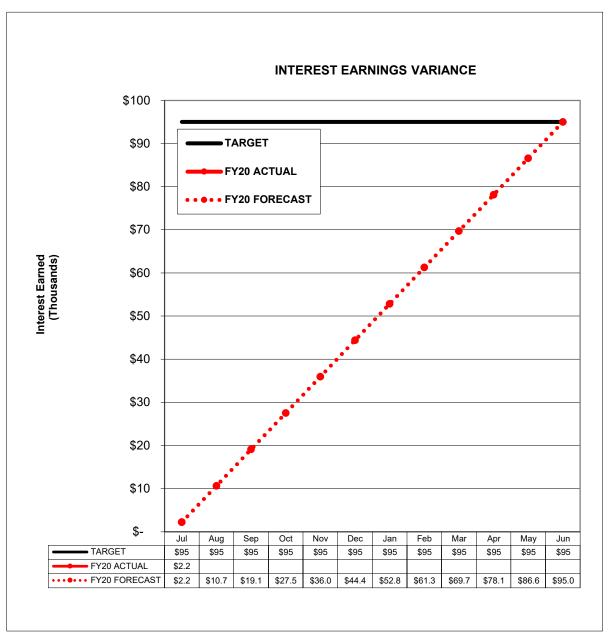

Interest Earnings Variance

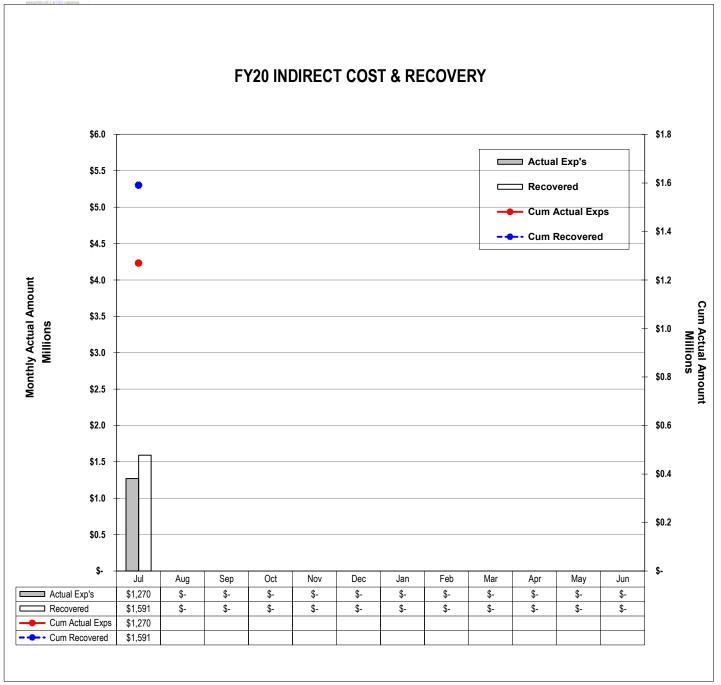

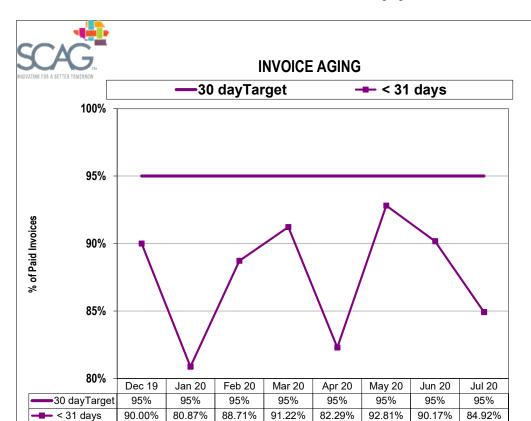

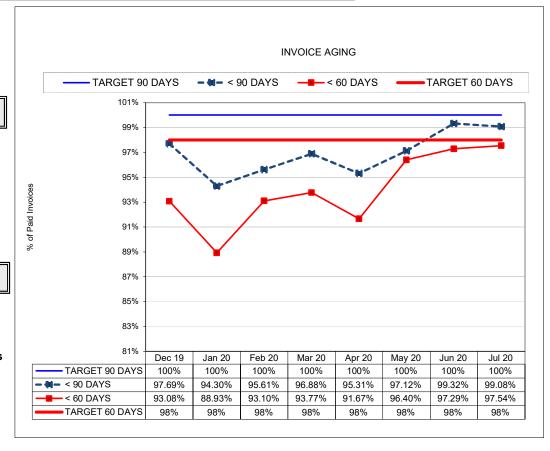

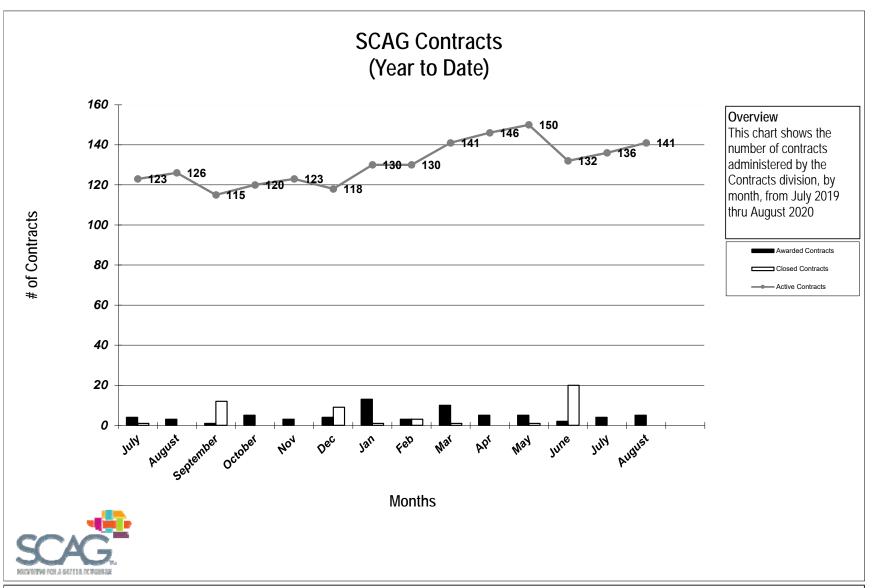

Summary

As illustrated on the chart, the Contracts Department is currently managing a total of 143 contracts. Fifty-nine (59) are Cost Plus Fee contracts; forty-two (42) are Lump Sum (formerly Fixed Price) contracts, and the remaining forty (40) are Time and Materials (T&M) contracts (includes Labor Hour and Retainer contracts). The Contracts Department anticipates issuing approximately eighty (80) contracts for FY 2020-21. Note, due to the nature of SCAG's work, the majority of SCAG contracts have a one year term and end on June 30th each year.
